Scripture Foundation: Ephesians 4:25-5:2

Key verses: 5:1-2:

Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children, 2 and live in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.

Too often, our busy lives are filled with work, tasks, and behaviors that leave no room for other things we aspire to do. We say we'd like to eat healthy foods, but have no time to cook. We say we'd like to spend more time with family, friends, and God, but fill our days with other activities that leave no room for these significant others. The tail wags the dog, or the cart pulls the horse. What would it look like to live more intentionally into the promises we make to ourselves and to others? Paul's letter to the Ephesians (4:25-5:2) gives us a reality check: in order to open our lives to the love of God in Christ, we must put away (give up) many habits of lying, isolation, and fear that leave no room for truth, love, and community. Giving up is hard. Yet Paul reminds us that Christ showed us the Way that leads to love, by giving himself up for us.

COMMISSION ON A WAY FORWARD Report Released, July 31, 2018

The final report of the Commission on a Way Forward has been released in all four official languages of the General Conference: English, French, Portuguese and Swahili. Our Bishop, Peggy Johnson, will hold an informational and Q&A session about the report in our District on **Tuesday, September 18, 2018, from 6:30-8:30 pm, at Cornerstone UMC**, 3135 Summit Bridge Rd Bear, DE 19701. Topic: "The Way Forward" Conversations about the February special session of General Conference that will deal with the issue of homosexuality and the UMC.

Please take the time to read the report and to lift up our United Methodist Church worldwide, that God may lead us together to live, love, and witness faithfully – and that we may glorify and love God in all things, as we love our neighbors as ourselves. Pastor Bo will be happy to speak with you about your questions or reactions to the report and process.

About the Commission: The 32-member Commission on a Way Forward was appointed by the Council of Bishops to assist the bishops in their charge from the 2016 General Conference to lead the church forward amid the present impasse related to LGBTQ inclusion and resulting questions about the unity of the church.

PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Saints.

I've been enjoying the rounds of meetings and opportunities to get to know leaders and members and friends of St. Paul's and to hear your stories. Of course, I feel a sense of urgency to meet everyone at once, but I'm learning to trust God to arrange the appointments and conversations, to not only be patient, but to live in the peace that Jesus creates in the grace that fills our lives. You cannot know how much it warms my heart to see the body of Christ in action throughout the week in our larger community, sharing the produce of our Covenant Garden, shuttling food from Wawa to the Neighborhood House, and stocking book bags with school supplies to show our love and support for children.

And you must know how much I enjoy worship at St. Paul's every Sunday, if you've been able to join us this summer since July 22.

A couple came to worship with us for the first time this past Sunday, and shared with me and with Vicki how wonderful it was to be welcomed and loved by so many people in the sanctuary before, during, and after worship. God has truly blessed us at St. Paul's with the gift of hospitality. I love especially how everyone belts out the "psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God" (borrowing a favorite phrase of St. Paul in Ephesians 5:19 and Colossians 3:16). In 1761, John Wesley instructed the early Methodists to "sing lustily and with a good courage Beware of singing as if you were half dead, or half asleep; but lift up your voice with strength...."

You got the memo!

As I think about what is most important in our community of faith, reflecting on the hospitality and worship and ministry to our neighbors that are the hallmarks of our life together, I believe that this is what it means to live as a community of disciples. But if you ask me to define discipleship, I would not begin with a laundry list of these behaviors — I would begin with the One who inspires and enables us to practice them. I would begin with Jesus. I love how we say "remember" when we gather to be nourished by his body and blood every Sunday, because in all the flurry of church todo's, we can forget the "Why?" of anything we do. Or, more accurately, the "Who?"

It's Jesus, who has brought us together. It's Jesus who saves our lives from the separation of sin and who reconciles us to God and to each other – who calls us friends. It's Jesus to whom we owe our lives, our very breath, and for whom we live. We don't have to ask "What would Jesus do?" because he is with us, inviting us to join him as he loves, saves, and serves the world. This is what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. We remember every moment of every day his loving, grace-filled presence in our lives, and we live as a light to reveal his presence in every person's life.

What a blessing it is to know Jesus. And what a blessing it is to be among those who know him and serve him with all their hearts every moment of their lives. I see Jesus in you, Saints!

NOTES from the LOFT

One of the hymns for the 11:00 AM worship service this Sunday is *Lord, Speak to Me.* The words were written by Frances Ridley Havergal in 1872, who also wrote *Take My Life and Let It Be.*

Frances was a gifted poet, pianist, and singer who grew up in a church and musical family. Her father was an Anglican clergyman, writer, composer and hymn writer who devoted himself to the improvement of church music. Her brother was also an Anglican clergyman and an organist. Frances was a child prodigy who began reading and memorizing the Bible at age four. By age seven she was writing poems. Havergal was plagued by poor health for most of her life and died at age 42. Fortunately, her surviving sisters took steps to ensure her hymns lived on by having much of her work published posthumously

The hymn tune to *Lord, Speak to Me* is adapted from music written by Robert Schumann. Schumann was one of the greatest composers of the Romantic era. He hoped to become a virtuoso pianist but a hand injury ended that dream. Schumann then focused his musical talents and energies on composing. Like Havergal, Schumann suffered with poor health for most of his life. Unlike Havergal, Schumann's illness was mental, not physical. Like Havergal, Schumann died early at age 46.

JOY EVENT



Olivia hometown: Middletown, DE



OLIVIA was a typical happy, healthy 3-year-old little girl, but that all changed on November 28, 2008. Olivia was coming down with symptoms of what seemed to be a cold.

During what was supposed to be a quick trip to AI duPont Children's Hospital in Wilmington, Delaware for IV fluids, things went from normal to serious. That evening, Olivia was diagnosed with a brain tumor and admitted to the ICU.

On December 1, the tumor was removed and shortly after, her family was given the diagnosis they had dreaded — medulloblastoma. Due to the lack of research, they had to weigh treatment options and consider quality vs. quantity of life for Olivia. While trying to decide on a path, Olivia was also suffering from posterior fossa syndrome.

On December 22, Olivia started her first round of chemotherapy prior to her family moving to Boston for proton radiation at Massachusetts General Hospital. Thus began what seemed to be endless rounds of radiation, physical therapy and chemotherapy.

Olivia is now 13 years old and attends Red Lion Christian Academy where she plays field hockey and soccer. She completed her 10th round of chemotherapy in March 2010. She is currently dealing with some late effects related to treatment, but her scans have shown no evidence of disease. Olivia is a very strong and brave girl who continues to defy the odds.
